Some Native Americans thought a giant sea turtle held up the earth. They believed that when the turtle moved, the earth moved. When the turtle moved more, the earth moved more, causing cracks in the earth's surface.

In India, it was believed that four elephants held up the earth. They stood on the back of a mountain tortoise. The mountain tortoise, in turn, balanced on the back of a snake. If any of these animals moved, the earth would shake and cause an earthquake. The greater the animal's movement, the greater the earthquake.

The ancient Greeks thought earthquakes showed the gods' wrath. A giant, named Atlas, had rebelled against the gods. As punishment, he had to hold the world on his shoulders. The Greeks believed that anytime Atlas adjusted the earth's weight on his shoulders, an earthquake followed. When Hercules sought Atlas' help to get the golden apples, Atlas agreed on the condition that Hercules carried the world for him. When Atlas returned with the apples, he told Hercules he was tired of holding the world so Hercules had to take over. Hercules agreed but said that he needed to put a pad on his shoulders first. Atlas foolishly agreed and took the world back. Having outsmarted Atlas, Hercules went on his way.

Even after scientists came up with explanations as to why earthquakes happen, many still held on to these age-old beliefs.

What do you do with your orange peels and apple cores? Most people throw them into the trash can. Many gardeners put their food waste in a special container known as a compost bin. Food waste can be broken down by bacteria and other micro-organisms into natural materials called compost. This process takes several months. Once the compost is created, gardeners spread this mixture in their gardens to add nutrients to the soil which helps plants to grow well.







It all starts on a dairy farm. Workers milk the cows at the farm and use refrigerated trucks to deliver the milk to an ice cream factory. At the ice cream factory, the milk is pumped into big storage tanks. Pipes then carry the milk to a blender where other ingredients are added to form the ice cream mix.

The blended mixture is then heated to kill bacteria so that the mixture will not go bad. Thereafter, the heated mixture is pumped through small holes to help the ingredients stay mixed together. The ice cream mix is then left to cool. To give the ingredients more time to blend, the mix is pumped into a big tank and kept for a few more hours.

The next step is to add flavour to the mixture. During this process, air is also added by stirring the ice cream as it begins to freeze. This helps to keep the ice cream mix soit.

The final step is adding chunky ingredients. Pieces of fruit or nuts are added to the ice cream before it is ready for packaging. Machines fill cartons with ice cream and put lids on them. The cartons are then channelled into a cold tunnel where the ice cream is frozen hard.

Ice cream is stored in a warehouse before being shipped to the shops. That is where you can find your favourite flavour.



During the team portion of the competition on July 18, she was awarded a perfect score for her routine on the uneven bars. It was the first time in modern Olympic gymnastics history that the score had ever been awarded.

There was an uproar after Comaneci's outstanding performance when the scoreboard showed a score of 1.00. The electronic scoreboard had spaces for only three digits and was unable to show the perfect score of 10.00 that the judges had awarded her. The crowd was at first confused, but soon understood and gave her a rousing ovation.

Over the course of the Olympics, Comaneci went on to win three gold trophies, one silver medal and one bronze medal. She also held the record for being the youngest Olympic gymnastics all-around champion ever. With the revised age-eligibility requirements in the sport, gymnasts must now turn sixteen years old before they are allowed to compete in the Olympics. Thus, it is currently not possible to legally break Comaneci's record.

In an interview, Comaneci's coach said, "Nadia's success is a result of her courage and phenomenal powers of concentration." To which, Nadia added, "Hard work too!"

It was the 1924 Olympics in France. Eric Liddell was a sprinter who was a potential gold medallist in the 100-metre dash. He trained hard to get into top shape.

However, when the schedule for the Olympics was announced and Liddell found out that the heats would fall on a Sunday, he said firmly, "I'm not running." He had set aside the day for God and wanting to stay true to his commitments, he 5 withdrew from his best event. Many people were disappointed but this did not get him down. Instead, Liddell decided to take part in other races. On 7 July 1924, Liddell even turned up at the finals of the 100-metre competition to cheer the competitors from his country on to victory.

Liddell worked hard to train and build up his stamina for the new and longer 10 200-metre and 400-metre races. Critics were on a lookout to see how Liddell would fare. True enough, on 9 July 1924, many people criticised Liddell's performance in the 200-metre final competition. Although Liddell had won a bronze, the Scottish newspaper stated that Liddell did not perform as well as he should have.

Nonetheless, Liddell pressed on. On 11 July 1924, his perseverance finally 15 paid off. The crowd went into a frenzy of enthusiasm as Eric Liddell won gold in the 400-metre race and broke the existing world record. When he was asked how he had managed to run so fast, Liddell responded, "The secret of my success is that I ran the first 200 metres as hard as I could. Then, for the second 200 metres, with God's help, I ran harder. I will always remember this triumphant moment!"

Throughout his athletic career, Liddell faced opposition from many sources as Liddell did not always do what people expected of him, such as running in his best event. Rather, his determination and dedication to God are an inspiration to everyone. Eric Liddell is truly a man who stood in the face of the supreme test of Olympic competition and never gave in.

Liow Kar Hock had got away five times with smuggling pupples into Singapore in the boot of his Malaysian-registered car. On 28 January 2011, his sixth trip, his luck ran out. Officers carrying out a search at the Woodlands Checkpoint found 16 pedigree pupples hidden in a specially-built speaker compartment in the boot of his car.

The 35-year-old was jailed for three months and fined \$16,000 after pleading guilty to 16 counts of bringing in dogs without a license. If he could not pay, he would have to serve another four months in jail.

Prosecuting officer Yap Teck Chuan of the Agri-Food and Veterinary Authority had asked the court to impose a severe sentence. This was because Liow could have introduced rables into Singapore. Rabies is a viral disease which is common among wild animals. Pets such as dogs and cats have to be vaccinated to prevent them from being infected by the virus.

The puppies brought in by Liow were not vaccinated. If they had been infected, these dogs would become extremely aggressive and bite humans. This in turn would pass on the disease, which will cause severe brain damage and even death.

In mid-December 2010, Liow came to know a man called Ah Wong who was in the business of smuggling puppies. Liow would drive in to Singapore with the puppies hidden in his car and meet a Singaporean contact known to him only as Ah Lai at a Pasir Ris carpark.

The other man would drive off in Liow's car, returning it later without the puppies. The court was not told how much Liow was paid or how many puppies were smuggled in during his earlier runs. He was caught on 28 January 2011 after a check by officers from the Immigration and Checkpoints Authority.

Liow, who did not have a lawyer, pleaded guilty to the charges and asked the judge for leniency and a light fine. He could have been fined up to \$10,000 and/or jailed for a year on each charge.

The Rubik's Cube was invented by a Hungarian university professor, Erno Rubik. Professor Rubik only wanted to create a working model to explain a Mathematical problem but ended up creating the world's best-selling toy. Besides teaching at the university, **he** was also an architect and a designer. Rubik called his invention the 'Magic Cube' but it was later renamed Rubik's Cube by Ideal Toy Corporation, which manufactured the cubes, in 1980.

In a classic Rubik's Cube, each of the six faces is covered by nine stickers of six solid colours, traditionally white, red, blue, orange, green, and yellow. There has been a variation made to the Rubik's Cube. Instead of solid colours, pictures are featured on the stickers. Some cubes have four, sixteen, or even more stickers on each face instead of the standard nine. Plastic pieces joint together enables each face to turn independently, thus mixing up the colours.

For the puzzles to be solved, each face must have the same colours. While a novice might take hours to solve the puzzle, experts can solve it in under a minute. In May 2007, Thibaut Jacquinot of France became the first person to solve the puzzle in under 10 seconds in an open competition, setting a world record time of 9.86 seconds. The current world record is held by Yu Nakajima of Japan with a time of 8.72 seconds. Many websites dedicated to helping people solve Rubik's Cube puzzles have sprung up recently. These websites often include videos which are easier to follow than step-by-step written instructions found in books.

National and International 'Speedcubing' Championships have been held regularly since 2003 to determine the fastest fingers. Speedcubing uses the player's average time out of five attempts to determine the winner. The World Cube Association now runs competitions where players have to solve the puzzles one-handed, as well as having to solve the puzzles using only the feet. There is even a competition where players have to solve the puzzles as quickly as possible blindfolded! This makes Rubik's Cube competition even more challenging.

African wild dogs, which live in Africa, only have four toes, while domestic dogs and wolves have five. You would not want to count them for yourself because these are truly wild animals.

"Wild dogs are not somebody's domestic dogs that had run away and didn't come back, although some people used to think so," explains Dr. McNutt. "They are actually Africa's wolves, and just like wolves, they do not make good pets. They need to be out in the wild doing what they are supposed to be doing—running many miles every day and hunting to find the food they need to survive and feed pups."

In fact, the African wild dogs travel so far that researchers use radio collars to keep track of them. The collars send out radio signals that tell people where the dogs are.

These dogs are smart and sociable, like pet dogs. They enjoy one another 's company and live in packs of about six to twenty animals. Both males and females look out for young dogs and make sure they have food. They like pups so much that they will even take care of orphans that do not belong to them.

There are two common types of calls that the African wild dogs use to talk to each other. The 'hoo' call is a call that they make when lost or when a pack member is missing. The dogs can hear the call two or three miles away and easily find each other.

"On the other hand," says Dr. McNutt, "the 'twitter' calls can only be heard over very short distances, and are used to wake up the pack members and gather them to go hunting."

World War Two ended on 17 May 1945 in Europe. On that day, Germany surrendered to America. However, the Japanese continued to battle against America, despite repeated demands to end the war.

Mr Truman, America's president at the time, struggled with what to do. Japan had attacked an American naval base at Pearl Harbour. Many Americans felt that the Japanese had to be stopped. Mr Truman decided to do something drastic.

Mr Truman made one of the biggest decisions in history. He ordered the use of an atomic bomb. The bomb was the deadliest 10 weapon ever made. It had been tested, but never used. Scientists believed it could destroy an entire town and cause illness in its people for years to come.

On 6 August 1945, an American airplane dropped the first atomic bomb used in warfare on a Japanese military town, 15 Hiroshima. Three days later, Nagasaki, another town in Japan, suffered the same fate as Hiroshima. Japan was devastated. The bombs killed numerous people. It destroyed large areas of both

cities. the bombs released hazardous chemicals into the air and remained in the atmosphere for some time. This made poeple 20 very sick. Thousands more died because of the exprosure to these harmful, cancer-causing chemicals.

The terrible destruction caused by the bombs led Japan to surrender on 2 September 1945. Japan's surrender meant that the war was finally over.




