



Beneficiaries Stories

Nick Tan is a beneficiary of The School Lunch Money Fund (TSLMF). The \$95 a month he receives covers some of his school-related expenses.

Two years ago, he was a rebellious boy who often loitered on the streets. Today, Nick, 14, is one of the top students in his class and spends his free time playing badminton.

Nick's 50-year-old mother is disabled. His father, 52, works as a bus driver. His calary to hardly enough for the family of six, which includes Nick's three young sisters.

The monthly allowance from TSLMF helps the family to make onds meet. "It assists us with our expenses," said Nick's mother, Madam Choos.

Nick said that the movey pays for necessities like feed and his transportation to school. "I don't have to worry very much and can concentrate on my studies... In future, I would like to help others as others have helped me."

This is the story of Elicia binte Basin, told in her own words.

Before, life was not as easy as now. My main had to take core of us on her own, She would setrifice her own needs and wants in order to ensure we received an education. She also tried to give us what we wanted. Though she gave us the 'green light' to indulge occasionally in our wants, my siblings and I always tried hard to save money because we know how hard it was for our mother.

The situation deteriorated when my main started having severe headaches, stamech aches and frequent vaniting. We were worried and our studies were affected. She was diagnosed with concer and could not go out to work. Nor could she be at home. I visited her every day at the hospital, I would go from home to school, from school to the hospital, and then back home at night. This cycle continued till she was finally discharged.

It was a crucial year for me as I had major exams in secondary school, I used whatever time I had at the hospital and at home to study *fariously*:

The School Lunch Money Fund (TSLMF) come into our lives and aided as financially and emotionally. Our problems were not all solved but the burden was lightened. 

On 14 October 2014, tracker dogs led some rangers to a group of armed poachers who were on the run. The poachers had shot and killed a well-known elephant just outside Tarangire National Park. This was the latest in a string of successes by Tanzania's tracker dogs. The dogs are proving to be an effective weapon in the war against elephant poaching in the extreme terrains and harsh climate of East Africa which are daunting for humans.

"Apart from their incredible tracking abilities, dogs are wonderful to work with because they don't have any political agenda," said Damien Bell, director of Big Life Tanzania, the conservation organisation that manages the Big Life Tracker Dog Unit.

It was early in the morning when rangers found the dead elephant, deep in the forested Lesimingori Mountains in Tanzania where protection for elephants is sometimes weaker. It died, from a single bullet to the head, after wandering into the rolling foothills in an attempt to migrate as it had done several times before.

Strangely, the animal's tusks were still in place when the authorities arrived at the scene in the morning. It appeared that the poachers were startled by fast-acting community members and rangers and had abandoned the carcass before they had time to remove its huge teeth and make their escape. For other anti-poaching operations, this is often the end of the story. Criminals escape. Scene is investigated. Report is written and filed away. However, this was not how it went down this time. Rocky and the Big Life Foundation Tracker Dog Unit were called in to pursue the criminals on foot.

Rocky arrived at the scene with his handlers, and soon he was sniffing and pacing up and down beside the dead elephant, about to explode with excitement. He had picked up the human scents from footprints near the carcass. It seemed that multiple people had been at the crime scene the night before. Then the dogs were off on their dusty trail. Rocky led the chase through the foothills and scrublands of the Lesimingori, frantically tugging his handler at the end of the lead. After five hours of relentless progress, the heat finally wore him down and his protégé, Rosdus, took over.

Rosdus, new to the unit, did not disappoint his mentor. He took the team all the way to the main highway, where the other dogs and handlers followed his lead through the town and into a particular home. There, a man




DEFORESTATION AND THE ORANG UTAN



The orang utan, a species of great ape known for its keen intelligence, is native to the tropical rainforests of Indonesia and Malaysia. The biggest threat to the orang utan today is deforestation. A 2007 assessment by the United Nations Environment Program predicts grimly that orang utans will be virtually eliminated in the wild within two decades if current deforestation trends continue. One study even shows that a forest area of about 300 soccer fields is being destroyed every hour!

While small independent farmers are cutting down strips of the rainforest to plant their crops, the main cause for deforestation in Indonesia and Malaysia is the spread of palm oil plantations. The Centre for Science in the Public Interest reports that over the last four decades, the total land area planted with oil palm has grown to over 3 million hectares in Indonesia and 3.5 million hectares in Malaysia. Palm oil plantations are now often cited as the leading cause of rainforest destruction in Malaysia and Indonesia.



Palm oil is often cultivated in an unsustainable way. The unsustainable establishment of mass palm oil plantations is harming the environment, indigenous communities and wildlife. Adult orang utans that are supremely adapted to life in trees almost never touch the ground. Thus, forest degradation, fragmentation and outright cleaning—sometimes by intentionally-set fires are the main reasons for the species' population decline.



The burning of forests to clear land for palm oil plantations is also a major cause of air pollution in Southeast Asia. It releases carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, contributing to global warming.

The crevice was a little more than a crack in the rough terrain, barely 50cm wide. Curious, Seth stood at its edge, poised to go in. It was just before noon on 20 June 2015. The sun was high in the sky but it was still chilly in the Nottawasaga Bluffs, a rugged area in a snow belt about 140km northeast of Toronto, Canada.

Seth knew the temperature inside the crevice will hover around -2°C. But he loved the challenge of exploring caves and crevices and he believed that his jeans, T-shirt and sturdy jacket should give him enough protection. "I won't be long," he thought.

Growing up in Singapore in the 1940s, amid the deprivation of food and uncertainty brought about by the war, the idea of keeping a dog was never a consideration. So, when my daughter, then six years old, asked me if we could have a dog when we moved to New York, the answer was no. I knew that she would be tired of the animal soon and that I would be responsible for looking after it. As this was not a reason which could resonate with a six year old, I had to refuse on the ground that the streets of New York were too dangerous for a child her age to walk a dog.

When we returned to Singapore, this reason was no longer credible. As such, there was a half-hearted agreement to look for a suitable Labrador retriever.

One day, after lunch in Upper Thomson Road, we made a detour to a pet shop nearby. There was no intention to buy anything. It was an attempt to mollify a young girl and to put off to a later date any idea of buying a dog.

Needless to say, it did not work out as I had planned. After several minutes of looking around, we came across a rascally little collie that would not stop licking and nibbling our fingers. 

The ship slowly moved away from the dock. Her crew worked busily while the passengers stood on the decks, some looking out at the sea and others waving to their families and friends. Apart from the crew, I was the only one who had no friends or relatives with me or to see me off. In one pathetic move, I raised my hand to wave goodbye to Singapore.

The huge merchant vessel carried both cargo and passengers, it moved at about ten nautical miles per hour. Navigation was by landmarks and compass bearings, the stars in the night and sun positions in the day. The journey would take thirty-nine days with six stopovers between Singapore and Southampton.

The crew of about thirty consisted of the captain, deck officers, engineers, stewards, cooks and sailors. Everything in the ship was basic and functional including my third-class four-person cabin. All the cabins had an area of about fourteen square metres, a height of two metres and a small porthole for ventilation. I shared my cabin with an elderly Frenchman named Anton, a Portuguese priest and a quiescent young man of unknown nationality. There were not many variety of activities on board. The days I had on the ship were spent on eating, sleeping, reading, writing my diary and looking at the stars and the sea.

The first part of the journey was through the Straits of Malacca. The voyage should be smooth unless we had the misfortune to meet pirates that plied the route targeting Europe-bound ships. The passengers were given strict instructions to stay 20 in the cabins if the ship were to slow down and a signal was sounded. The captain and his officers would handle the pirates and after a bit of delay, we would be on our way again. If the ship was robbed of some of its coal, we would have to stop over at Penang for bunkering and the trip would be extended by two days. Fortunately, we did not have such an encounter and headed for Colombo without any trouble.

For twelve days, we were blessed with fine weather and small storms that came and went quickly. Mother Nature displayed her full glory with sensational sunrises and sunsets, and beautiful rainbows that spanned the sky after showers. However, on the thirteenth day, the ship hit a tropical cyclone that threw it about ferociously. Gigantic waves behaved like whips rather than bodies of water. Things were 30 crashing down, people were falling and every other person was throwing up. Anton, who was partially blind and deaf, clung fightly to me. He was shouting words that I did not understand and was yelling even louder thinking that I could not hear him.

After a while, the young man of unknown nationality told me the old man needed his medicine that could be found in a bag under the bunk bed. When Anton had his medicine, he seemed sedated and released his clasp on me. I stayed close to him in case he needed more help.

Twenty-four hours passed and the storm was still raging. None of the passengers ventured outside and the cabins were getting into an uninhabitable state. If one did not get nauseated from motion sickness, it would be from the foul smell of vomit. No food was served and nobody had the appetite anyway. I could not take it on the second day of the storm and I went to stand at the deck for some fresh air.

Interview with John Tan, a resident in Greendale Woods.

Describe your experience with dengue fever.

I remember waking up one morning with chills and I was feeling extremely weak. Within a day, I developed a low-grade fever. I started getting a headache, as well as aches and pains in my joints. I initially thought that I was just getting the flu. I took some medication and thought that I would feel better soon.

However, by the third day, I was confined to my bed and my fever went up to 42 degrees. My family immediately sent me to the hospital. There, the doctors connected me to a drip and ran some blood tests. I was then diagnosed with dengue. That took me by surprise. I had been bitten by the dreaded Aedes mosquito!

The stay in the hospital was agonising. There was no specific treatment for dengue. Your body's own immune system has to overcome the virus. As I was lying on the hospital bed, I could not help but think about my unhealthy lifestyle. How I wished I had built up my immune system by exercising and eating healthier food.

Without any medication to treat the virus, I could only endure the pain. The only medication given to me did not help at all. A rash soon developed. There were tiny red spots that sprouted all over my shoulders, chest and arms. I was scratching away. It was unbearable. I had no appetite as every time I ate, I vomited.

The fight against dengue lasted up to a week. During that long week, I read up on how dengue is spread and how to prevent the breeding of Aedes mosquitoes. When I could finally leave the hospital, I resolved to spread the awareness of dengue. Let us protect ourselves from dengue!

My parents migrated from America to Africa and I spent my growing years in Africa. I often accompanied Mother, a doctor, on her rounds. We went in a car that was outfitted to contain a medical chest filled with equipment. In **this mobile clinic**, we travelled to the nearby villages around the South African town that we lived in. Vaccination programmes against the local common diseases were part of our routine.

I helped with the oral vaccine for children. Each child would line up in front of me for a sugar lump coated with the vaccine. Then I would call for 'tongues out' to make sure that the children had all swallowed the vaccine. My biggest problem, however, was preventing the children from lining up again to get a second sweet treat.

As I grew older, wars erupted among the different countries in Africa. To escape, I to left for America and worked at a newspaper as a reporter. Years later, the newspaper assigned me to South Africa to report on the local wars. By then, the South African town I had grown up in was cordoned off from foreign reporters. I pretended to be part of the local government officials who were touring the town and managed to slip in unnoticed into my childhood town. I wandered off from the group and drove off to the villages where I had helped Mother with her vaccination programmes.

Soon, I stopped at a trading store. Keen to obtain a story for my newspaper, I asked the storekeeper if he ever saw rebel soldiers in the village. His wide smile quickly vanished. From the farthest corner of the store, I heard metallic chinking. In the corner, six men posed menacingly. I had the answer that I wanted. One of them gestured to me and said, "You are coming with us back to our base."

After half a day, the soldiers' English speaker left us and conversation stopped. My captors were rather polite as I had been cooperative from the very beginning. I could guess from their gesturing that the stories about me became more and more embellished as we journeyed to the base camp. I had resisted. I was armed. I was a spy.

We finally reached their base on the second day. I was presented to the camp commander. Until then, I had not understood the languages they were speaking. When the commander gave his orders, it was in the familiar African dialect that I had grown up with. Hesitantly, I greeted him in what I could remember of the dialect.

He was amazed and asked me where I had learnt the dialect. I told him I had grown up around that area. He asked me again for my name and I told him, "Peter Godwin".

"Was your mother Dr Godwin, the doctor who vaccinated the villagers here for free?" he asked and I nodded. Smiling, he pulled up his sleeve and showed me a small vaccination scar on his shoulder. "And you were the one who gave me the sugar lump!" he exclaimed. Shaking my hands enthusiastically, he ordered his soldiers to immediately release me and to take me back to the trading store.

At the trading store, I was returned the things that had been confiscated. Before I left, my four companions insisted on a formal photograph. I still have the photograph— an evidence that good deed pays off.

I was grocery shopping recently in my hometown when I heard a young voice boom from across the aisle. "Mom, come here, you've got to see this! There's this lady here my size!" The mortified mother rushed to a boy she called Mikey, who looked to be about seven. Then she turned to me to apologize. "Oh, I'm so sorry."

I smiled and told her, "It's okay." Then I looked at her wide-eyed son and said,
"Hi, Mikey, I'm Darryl Kramer. How are you?" He studied me from head to toe, and

"It's the way God made me," I said. "Some people are little. Some are tall. I'm just not going to grow any bigger."

My life as a little person is filled with stories like these. I enjoy talking to children and explaining why I look different from their parents. It has taken many years of developing my confidence to be able to do that. And it's the children's questions that make my life special. My hope is that in taking time with them, I will encourage them to accept their peers, whatever size and shape they come in, and treat them with respect.

It takes only one glance to see my uniqueness. I stand three feet, nine inches
tall. I am an achondroplasia dwarf, which is a person having very short limbs. Not
knowing a lot about dwarfism, my mother's main concern was my health. Our family
doctor put her mind at ease when he told her he felt I would not have any major medical
concerns when I was a baby. He was right.

When I was growing up, my parents encouraged me to do all the things the kids around me did. So when my neighbours got two-wheel bikes, I got a two-wheel bike.

When they roller-skated, I roller-skated. Our neighbours looked out for me and treated me as one of them.

What I lacked in height, I made up for in personality - my ability to laugh, even at myself. For example, a few years ago, I was reaching into the washing machine at my parents' house to grab the wet clothes. I fell all the way in and yelled for Mother, who was sitting nearby reading a newspaper. Watching feet flying everywhere, she chuckled and said, "I should leave you in there." I laughed with her.

I'm 47 now, and the stares have not diminished as I've grown older. People ask my friends if I live in a dollhouse. They look in disbelief when they see me get out of my car on the driver's side. During those times, I try to keep a good attitude. When people are rude, I remind myself, "Look what else I have — a great family, nice friends. That's all I need."

We were ten teenagers on a month-long service mission to repair the homes of the underprivileged living in the Himalayan mountains. The area appeared to contradict itself, for it held so much magnificence yet housed so much poverty. We saw ourselves as being able to serve those in need but not benefiting from it.

We drove our green van through the mountainous landscape and pulled 5 up alongside Raj's house. As the doors opened, we poured out with harmmers in hand, and prepared to start our usual routine. We interchanged jobs as we basked in the sun. Some of us painted the windows while others stained the deck or mended the roof! We passed the time with private jokes and songs. Despite the monotony of painting window after window, we truly enjoyed ourselves, All the while, Raj, a 10 retiree, sat in a lawn chair observing us with a cane in hand to support himself in case he needed to get up.

As the clock neared noon, we took our lunch break in the shelter of a small tree in Raj's front yard. Dave, our facilitator, planted Raj's chair beside us and announced that since he was to assist in any way possible, Raj would lead us in a 15 before-meal prayer. He saw our weary faces and heard the growls, from our stomachs. He kept it short and we soon began digging into our food.

"Let me tell you a story...," he then started. From the pit of his modest heart, he began to unravel his eighty-some-odd years for us. He was a school teacher who had a dog named Spikey. He told of old hunting expeditions in the 20 mountains where his life was almost lost to a bear. He also shared about the killing of rattlesnakes.

Then his eyes just wandered off as if he was no longer talking for our benefit, but more for his own. He described that day his dog died, as heavy tears rolled down his weathered cheeks and he clasped the end of his cane. He recalled 25 her faithfulness to the end as with one last thump of the tail, looking up at him, Spikey passed on. He remembered his wife gazing up at him much the same way seconds before her death.

He always tenderly called his wife 'Mama'. He told of how she had always stayed up until the wee hours of the morning to bake bread for him while he, often 30 exhausted from a long day of teaching or hunting, would retire to bed. "Why hadn't I taken the extra time to stay up with her?" he said in a distant voice as his eyes gazed beyond us. "Why couldn't I do so? Why?"

I remembered how intensely those words rang inside me. Here was a man brimming with wisdom and reflections on his life, telling me to make the most of, 35 mine, to take the extra time with those I love: I was motivated. 

I could see a thin dark trickle of venom running down the snake-man's night boot where the snake had struck. "That's a good boy," the snake-man said softly. This fiftle I thought I could hear fear in his voice. He simply had no choice but to persist. Mambas are widely considered the world's deadliest snakes. A mamba can move faster than a galloping horse. How could he run that fast? As he was speaking, he was slowly lowering the end of the pole until the forked prongs were about thirty centimetres above the middle of the snake's body.

Then without warning, the rubber prongs came down right across the snake's body, about midway along its length and pinned it to the floor. All I could see was a green blur as the snake thrashed around funously in an effort to free itself. However, the snake-man kept up the pressure on the prongs and the snake was trapped.

Holding the very end of the pole, the snake-man began to work his way round the room until he was at the tail end of the snake. Then, in spite of the flailing and thrashing, he started pushing the prongs forward along the snake's body toward the head. Very, very slowly he did it, pushing the rubber prongs forward over the snake's flailing body, keeping the snake pinned down all the time and pushing the long wooden rod forward millimetre by millimetre. It was a fascinating and frightening thing to watch. The snake's body was thumping against the coconut matting, making a noise that if you had been upstairs, you might have thought two big men were wrestling on the floor.

Then at last the prongs were right behind the head itself, pinning it down and at that point the snake-man reached forward with one gloved hand and grasped the snake very securely by the neck. He threw away the pole. He took the sack off the shoulder with his free hand. He lifted the deadly green snake and pushed the head into the sack. 





Throughout his youth, Sparky was socially awkward. It was not that the other students disliked him. It was just that no one really cared all that much. In fact, Sparky was astonished if a classmate ever spoke to him outside of school hours. Sparky was a loser. His classmates, even himself, knew it. As a result, he learnt to live with it. He made up his mind early that if things were meant to work out, they would. Otherwise he would be contented with what life had in store for him.

However, one thing was important to Sparky – drawing. He was proud of his artwork. No one else appreciated it. That did not matter to him. In his senior year of high school, he submitted some cartoons for the school's yearbook. The editors rejected his concept. Despite that, Sparky was convinced of his ability. He even decided to become an artist.

After completing high school, Sparky wrote in to Walt Disney Studios. They asked for samples of his artwork. In spite of his careful preparation, it too was rejected. That was one more confirmation that he was a loser.

Even with that setback, Sparky still did not give up. Instead, he decided to tell his life story in cartoons. The main character would be a little boy who symbolised the perpetual loser and chronic underachiever. Sparky's cartoon character went on to become a cultural phenomenon of sorts. People readily identified with this 'lovable loser'. He reminded people of the painful and embarrassing moments from their own past, of their pain and their shared humanity. The character - Charlie Brown - soon became famous worldwide. Sparky, the boy whose many failures never stopped him from trying, whose work was rejected repeatedly, is the highly successful cartoonist, Charles Schultz. His cartoon strip, 'Peanuts', continues to inspire books and T-shirts. His story reminds us that life somehow finds a way for all of us, even the losers.

Sparky's story reminds us of a very important principle in life. We all face difficulty and discouragement from time to time. We have a choice in how we handle them, if we are 30 persistent, if we continue to develop the unique talents we have, who knows what can happen. We may end up with an insight and an ability to inspire that comes only through hardship. In the end, there are no 'losers'. Some winners just take longer to develop!







When the geremonies were over, Sadako led the others straight to the old lady who sold cotton candy. It tasted even better than last year.







Did you know?

Orang Utans are losing their forest home to palm oil and paper plantations. Let's be conscious consumers by purchasing sustainably-sourced products!

Overview

Known for their distinctive red fur, Orang Utans are the largest arboreal mammal, spending most of their time in trees. Long, powerful arms and grasping hands and feet allow them to move through the branches. These great apes share 96.4% of our genes and are highly intelligent creatures.

The name 'Orang Utan' means 'man of the forest'. In the lowland forests in which they reside, they feast on wild fruits and slurp water from holes in trees. Adult male Orang Utans can weight up to 200 pounds'.

Endangered Species

The two species of Orang Utan, Bornean and Sumatran, differ little in appearance and behaviour although the Sumatran Orang Utans have longer facial hair. Both species have experienced sharp population declines and there are few left in the world.



Why They Matter

Orang Utans are 'gardeners' of the forest, playing a vital role in seed dispersal in their habitats. They live in tropical forests and prefer forests in river valleys and floodplains of their respective islands. Their extremely low reproductive rate makes their populations highly vulnerable. Females give birth to one infant at a time every 3 - 5 years.

Threats

Hunting and Illegal Wildlife Trade

Orang Utans are easy targets for hunters because they are large and slow targets. They are killed for food or in retaliation when they move into agricultural areas and destroy crops. This usually occurs when Orang Utans cannot find the food they need in the forest. Females are hunted most often. When caught with offspring, the young are often kept as pets.

When I was growing up, my parents took teaching jobs in a remote town in Quezon Province, the Philippines, leaving me and my younger sister and two younger brothers in the care of my grandparents in the town of Sampaloc.

Nanay, as we called my grandmother, did not hug or kiss children. A woman with a sharp tongue and words that make the heart bleed, Nanay was a tyrant - but she was there. We saw our parents only a few times a year, but as early as I could remember. Nanay had always been a part of my life. I believed grandmothers lived forever.

Nanay taught me many lessons. Most importantly, she taught me that my happiness comes first. "At the end of your life, you do not want to regret living a life for others but not yourself," she would always say.

Still, she had her weaknesses. When we were little, she adopted orphaned cats that slept on the sofa with her. The cats defecated inside the house and it made the whole place stink, but Nanay did not have the heart to punish them.

It was a different story with her grandchildren. When we displeased her, she threatened to die and haunt us. My grandfather was a submissive, quiet man who never interferred when Nanay spewed the curses that would befall us if we did not behave. As a result, I never feared anything like ghosts or vampires because I lived with the 'Real Thing'; Nanay could terrorise both young children and old men.

When I was thirteen, Nanay sent me to Manila to attend high school, and I stayed there for university. I came back each summer, but after I got married the visits became less frequent. Soon all of her grandchildren had moved out. After my grandfather had died, Nanay was left on her own. In her letters to me, she wrote of how lonely she was, but I never made the effort to spend more time with her.

Nanay died last year after suffering a stroke. She was 83, After the funeral, I went to our old house and helped sort through her possessions. I came across an old set of white crocheted curtains that she had made. I had not seen them in years. It was delicate. As I admired the hard work in the pattern, I realised I could repair the piece – using the crochet skills Nanay had taught me – and turn it into a tablecloth

When I visited her grave, I was filled with sorrow as I reflected on all the birthdays I had allowed to pass. I thought about all the stories she never got a chance to tell me, about her life, about the girl she once had been. It occurred to me that perhaps she did not know how to tell me because I had never thought to ask.

When the crocheted curtain-turned-tablecloth is complete, I will try something else.

Maybe I will cook sweetened sticky rice or make a patchwork blanket from scrap cloth.

The way Nanay taught me, the way I remember. I was right all along. Grandmothers live 35 forever. They are in their granddaughters' hearts.





An hour before midnight, the snow began to fall. Huddled in the warmth of our tent, I knew our last hope of climbing to the peak of a mountain known as K2 might diminish.

Only two of us were in the tent. My brother, Jack, and I had pitched our tent to rest for the night on the world's second tallest mountain. On the slopes far above us, two of our teammates had already pitched the tents near the peak of the mountain, ready for the ultimate challenge. However, if there was a snowstorm while they were attempting to accomplish their mission, it would cost them the victory. The extreme height of the mountain and dryness of the atmosphere would threaten the climbers with severe dehydration that could lead to death.

More than the mountain, the weather had been our problem from the start of our climb. During the two months since we had established base camp at the foot of the mountain, violent summer storms had swept the mountain, delaying our schedule to reach the peak.

In the early morning of September 5, we encountered a crisis. Food, fuel and our endurance had reached dangerously low levels. As snow continued to fall, I dozed off inside the tent. Occasionally, I woke up to peer grimly out at the weather. Jack, who was wide awake, opened the flap of the tent to check frequently. After a while he turned to me excitedly and said, "Alan, there are stars in the sky!"

In our years of climbing mountains, including Mount Everest, Lould vividly recall a few moments where there was a change in the weather. Nonetheless, I had mixed feelings. A change of weather did revive our hope to reach the peak of K2. However, this time, Jack and I had to make an agonising decision - whether to risk our lives and continue with the climb or give up and attempt the climb again in future. For years, we had longed to climb K2, as a sequel to our conquest of Mount Everest. Though Mount Everest was a higher mountain, I felt K2 which measured at about 8 600 metres above sea level was a more dangerous mountain to climb.

Sunrise took an eternity. Finally, the first rays touched the peak above. Jack used his camera with a telephoto lens to capture a panoramic view of the mountain. Then, he tried to track the other two teammates along the slopes of the mountain range with a camera. Through his lens, he soon spotted two microscopic figures.

"Our teammates are going for it!" Jack exclaimed excitedly. I sensed a chill down my spine. Would they survive? Against all odds, hour by hour, the figures persevered and advanced towards the peak.
