For most people, the village of Oymyakon would not be a top-of-the-list travel destination. It is the world's coldest area, located only a few hundred kilometres from the Arctic Circle.

But for New Zealand photographer Amos Chapple, it offered an opportunity he could not refuse. It was his chance to embark on a unique photography project. Chapple first had to get himself to Yakutsk in North-eastern Russia. There temperatures drop to minus forty degrees but despite its harsh weather conditions, it is a vibrant place.

Oymyakon, on the other hand, boasts just one major road leading in and out of it. It is known as the 'Road of Bones' because the skeletons of 10 prisoners who died during its construction were used in its foundations. In order to reach Cymyakon, Chapple had to travel for two days from Yakutsk, by a combination of shared vans and hitchhiking.

At one point, he found himself stranded at a petrol station.

"I was eating reindeer meat for two vday" he says recalling the small | 15 café and teahouse that sold his sole option for food during that time. "Reindeer was the staple meat of that region." It was not the only thing the inhabitants of this ice-covered region eat, but their diet is meat-heavy." Chapple also tried a dish of macaroni pasta and frozen chunks of horse blood, as well a speciality of thinly shaved frozen fish.

When Chapple arrived in Oymyakon, where the population is about 500 people, he was struck by the emptiness of the place. "The streets were just empty. I had expected that they would be accustomed to the cold and there would be life on the streets, but instead everyone was indoors. I was not welcomed indoors because I was a stranger." In the hours that Chapple spent | 25 wandering outdoors, his companions were usually street dogs.

Still, life in the village goes on. Schools do not close unless the temperatures fall way below 40 degrees, Farmers bring their cows to the village's watering hole. It is a 'hot' spring that stays a little above freezing .The farmers then lead their cows back to their insulated stables. The spring is the 30 village's lifeblood, Reindeer herders would visit the spring in order to hydrate their animals, returning again and again until the village became a permanent

Living in the coldest permanently inhabited place on Earth has its distinct drawback. It is utterly dark for up to 21 hours a day during the winter.

Bathrooms are mostly outdoors because indoor plumbing is a challenge due to frozen pipelines. Residents have cars, but they must leave them running outside, sometimes overnight, so that the mechanics do not freeze up.



The bus for Yichang pulled out of Beijing's Jinjiadun Station trailing a blue cloud of burning oil, and thirty minutes later we were speeding down an open highway. I was sitting near the driver, and I leaned forward to check the speedometer. It was not working – the needle sat limply at zero. It was clear that we were going very fast, in fact too fast, but the driver simply patted back a yawn. 5

We were entering a town with a posted speed limit of 50 km/h. Rather than slowing down, the driver sounded the horn repeatedly to warn pedestrians, vehicles and animals to get out of his way. The horn button was broken. To use it, he held two exposed wires together – taking both hands off the wheel each time.

After two hours, we had braked twice abruptly enough to push my upper torso into the seat in front of me, swerved at the last second to avoid an oncoming truck, passed on a blind curve, forced an oncoming van off the road and skidded on a gravel shoulder, scraping the guard rail. I left the bus unscathed but newspaper headlines for the month of October showed that passengers on other buses across Asia were not so fortunate.

The details might vary but the stories behind these and the hundreds of other Asian bus accidents last year had certain common denominators: overworked, exhausted drivers racing each other to pick up passengers and revenue, twisting two-lane mountain roads with inadequate guard rails, incompetent drivers and unsafe vehicles placed on the road by corrupt officials.

It was a recipe for disaster especially so for the millions of us who depended on buses for transportation nearly every day of our lives. Yet one of the difficulties in coping with this deadly problem was that there was no solid information about exactly how serious it was. However, studies had shown that the driver was the single most lethal ingredient in this recipe for disaster. "Inadequate training or no training is a major problem," said an official. A study showed that driver error was the major cause of bus accidents.



Life for Mila and Dala Lama came to a clashing halt when a 7.8-magnitude earthquake rocked Nepal in April 2015. The couple scurried out in the nick of time, but their house was damaged beyond repair. While most of the buildings in Manekharka were made of rocks held together by mud, the Lamas' home was a sturdier wood-and-stone structure reinforced with concrete. Despite this, the roof had caved in, several walls had toppled over and it was on the verge of collapse.

Prior to the earthquake, Manekharka was a quiet, picturesque area where villages were seen perched on the mountains in Nepal. The people there lived a peaceful and tranquil life. The devastating earthquake had robbed the villagers of that. Dozens of homes were completely flattened and the livelihoods of the villagers were threatened.

After the earthquake, Mila and Dala, along with 23 other villagers, spent more than two weeks huddled under a plastic canvas to shelter from the nightly monsoon downpours while waiting for rescue. With crops buried under the rubble, food was scarce. The rains dashed the villagers' hopes of retrieving any clothes or food reserves from the rubble.

All Mila had was a bag of potatoes that she had bought a few hours before the earthquake. It was placed by the front door. The family survived the entire ordeal eating curry made with boiled potatoes and spices they borrowed from their neighbours. The Nepali community leaned on one another during those difficult 20 weeks by cooking and sharing meals together as one family.

Due to the monsoon, there were growing concerns of potential flooding and landslides as the rains poured. This further slowed down and hindered the relief process as the rescuers the government had deployed took a longer time to reach the village. While waiting for help to arrive, life was rather grim in Manekharka. However, the Lamas were inspired by heartwarming acts of kindness around them. Volunteers from surrounding villages hiked for more than 10 hours to the village to join the medical team at the hospital.

After two weeks, Dala started sifting through the rubble. As an experienced carpenter, he salvaged some tin sheets, a doorframe and some mesh wiring to build 30 a makeshift shed for his family with a borrowed hammer and nails. Within a couple of days, he was able to protect his wife and three young dhildrea frommethour or and wild coiled to the coiled to the

Due to the relative isolation of the island, the people of Jeju Island have developed a culture and language that is distinct from those of mainland Korea. It is a magical place known for 3 things: roaring winds, magnificent rocks and women since there is a bigger population of women.

'sea' Women of Jeju Island

For hundreds of years, many women in Jeju Island have made their living through harvesting seafood by hand from the ocean floor. The 'sea' women do not use any breathing equipment although a typical dive might last around two minutes!

Highly popular, Formula One (F1) racing is a motor sport in which drivers race each other in super-fast cars. Michael Schumacher was an F1 racer for nineteen years until he retired in 2012. He won the world championship seven times - a feat no one else has achieved.

Schumacher came from a poor family. His father did not earn much money from his job as a *bricklayer. It was not easy for Schumacher's family to make ends meet. But Schumacher's incredible strength and determination made it possible for him to rise to become the most successful driver in F1 history. He did this through sheer hard work and self-discipline. His competitors admired him for his single-minded determination to overcome obstacles.

Unfortunately, some years after his retirement, Schumacher was involved in an accident. He was skiing with his son and some friends in France. Skiing is a sport in which people slide down snow-covered mountain slopes by using a pair of long, narrow strips called skis that they wear on their feet.

Schumacher was a professional skier. He was also a very careful skier. In spite of that, he crashed into a partially hidden rock. The impact flung him against another rock. He hit his head so hard that his helmet split into two pieces. He was immediately taken to a hospital.

Doctors found that his brain was damaged and terribly swollen as a result of the blow to his head. There were big blood clots in his brain, causing him to go into a coma. Doctors tried very hard to remove them. Meanwhile, his family and friends hoped that the former F1 champion would demonstrate the same grit and determination he had shown in winning F1 races to pull through and wake up.

After some months, Schumacher made progress and finally regained consciousness. He is currently paralysed and needs to re-learn basic skills like walking, talking and remembering simple things. Compared to how he

had lived his life on the fast lanes of F1 where he could do everything accurately and quickly, this must be extremely difficult and frustrating for him.

The accident has taken a great toll on Schumacher's family. His wife, Corinna, has reportedly taken over her husband's 500 million dollar business empire as he is unable to manage his business while he receives treatment for his injuries.

Corinna Schumacher has sold their 25 million dollar jet and holiday home as she believes he will 'never fully recover to enjoy them again' after the life-changing skiing accident in the French Alps in 2013. She is also considering selling their winter home there, where the accident took place. To her, it is a painful reminder of the tragedy that occurred. A report in a German newspaper said, 'Corinna is now alone, alone in a golden empire.'

Schumacher requires round the clock care at his mansion in Gland, Switzerland. Recently, his doctors said that the 46-year-old has made little progress as he is immobile and cannot speak.

The Incredible Benefits of Dramatic Play In Child Development as stated by Dr Wells



Where can you find police officers, princesses, and chefs all happily working side-by-side? In a dramatic play area of a classroom, of course.

A child's pretend play in classrooms or at home is often considered fun and imaginative, but of little educational value. The truth is, it is important in child development. Through pretend play, children learn to:

Synthesise knowledge and skills

Children need opportunities to blend their skills and knowledge together. Pretend play is an ideal way to do this. Think of children acting out a scene at the grocery store. They sort by attributes as they group similar foods in sections of the store, use math concepts to tabulate amounts as they determine prices and calculate grocery bills, use writing to communicate by making signs, experiment with shapes and weights as they organise the store, work collaboratively, and much more.

Work out confusing, scary, or new life issues

Have you ever witnessed children pretending to visit the doctor? One child holds the 'stethoscope' as the others line up for a check-up and get 'shots'. This is a child's way of exploring an experience that is common and sometimes confusing or scary. Through these role plays, children become more comfortable and prepared for life events in a safe way.

Cultivate social and emotional intelligence

How we interact with others is key to our lifelong success and happiness. Knowing how to read social cues, recognise and regulate emotions as well as negotiate and take turns are no easy tasks. There is no substitute for creative and imaginative play when it comes to teaching and enhancing these abilities in children.



So next time you see your children engaged in pretend play, let them be. Allow time for them to build a rocket ship from chairs and blankets, pretending to be astronauts; it's time well spent. You might consider crafting a space helmet from aluminium foil and a bowl, and joining in!

She was riding pillon on her husband's motorcycle when she saw a car speeding against the flow of traffic towards them. Before her husband could react, the Mercedes-Benz hit their bike, sending them hurtling through the air.

As Madam Janice Choo, 34, lay injured on the Ayer Rajah Expressway (AYE), her first concern was for the safety of her husband, Mr Teh Tze Yong.

Then, racked by pain in her left leg, her next worry was whether she could walk again. The Malaysian couple, who live here, were among five people injured in the accident just before the underpass leading to the Tuas Checkpoint on Monday morning.

A Toyota driver was killed Instantly while his wife was injured. The Mercedes driver and a Mazda driver were also hurt. Businessman Lim Chai Heng, 55, was admitted to the National University Hospital (NUH) on Tuesday and charged with causing death by reckless or dangerous driving.

A video clip of the Mercedes hitting the motorbike has gone viral online. "It made me realise how lucky I am," Madam Choo told The New Paper yesterday from her NUH hospital bed. The administration officer said her husband was taking her to work at Tuas when the accident happened at about 8 am.

"I remember seeing the car coming towards me. I was shocked but I could not do anything. I remember thinking to myself, the car is definitely going to hit me," she said.

The impact sent her flying and when she landed, her first thought was of her husband. She wanted to make sure he was all right. Madam Choo was relieved when she saw him alive. She then told him that her leg hurt a lot.

Madam Choo has since undergone a five-hour operation on her fractured left leg. Her husband had two operations for fractures on both hands and injuries on three fingers. They are both warded at NUH but they have not been able to see each other due to their injuries.

The accident has made Madam Choo swear off motorcycles. She said, "I now feel afraid to ride a motorcycle." Madam Choo is worried how the injuries will affect their future. Her parents drove eight hours from their home in Perak, Malaysia, to visit the couple at NUH.

Mr Teh has just started working as a driver at Yang Kee Logistics about a month ago. "We will not be able to work for at least three months. I'm worried how we are going to pay the monthly rent for our home," she said. The couple pays \$650 a month to share a three-room flat in the Pioneer area with three relatives.

A Yang Kee Logistics spokesman said the company had been in contact with Mr Teh's family and would work closely with them to render support. His colleagues contributed some money to help them tide over this period.

Another victim, Mr Tan Han Boon, 34, recalls the Mercedes-Benz charging towards him against the flow of traffic. It sends shivers down his spine. His Mazda was beyond repair. Mr Tan suffered abrasions and neck pain.

Recalling the accident, Mr Tan said, "It was very surreal, like something in a movie." He said he had swerved his car to the left to avoid the oncoming Mercedes, causing him to collide with a bus. After that, he lost track of whatever happened.

The Process of Creative Writing

The six steps to having great ideas are:



Step 1 - Gather your information

Gather information by observing people and the world around you. Take interest in how people live, what they think and why they behave in a certain way. Also, read widely. Read the newspapers as well as novels. Do your research and write down interesting facts.

Step 2 - Sift through the information

See how all the information can fit together. Find the link between some of them. While doing this, you may have more ideas coming to you. The more you sift through the information, the better you understand it and the more ideas you will have.

Step 3 - Let the information grow

The next stage is to let the information grow and develop in your mind. It's a good idea to do something else for a while. Listen to some music or go for a walk to relax to stimulate your imagination and emotions.

Step 4 - The magical moment: Let the ideas flow

It's at this stage that you will know what you want to write about. The ideas will just flow spontaneously. However if it does not happen, keep writing down the ideas that you have. Be patient. The magical moment will happen.

Step 5 - Shape your idea

Shape your idea into something real. This is the climatic point of your writing.

Step 6 - Share your idea

Show your idea to others and see what they think. They may be able to add to it and make it better. They may introduce new ideas, and so the process becomes even more creative!







I heard "all the best" as the 25 dark silhouettes disappeared onto the bright stage one after another. I towered my head, took a deep breath and stepped onto the stage.

The next thing I knew, the show was over and the audience was giving me a thunderous applause. After my final bow, the curtain closed for good but the applause did not stop. The whole cast and crew of the show swept me up in congratulatory hugs. There 30 was a giant circle of people around me applauding. I tooked around the room and thought, "I want to do this forever."

Being a performer is not easy. It is one of the hardest things I can imagine doing. But all the work happens offstage, in classes and in rehearsals. For every hour of performance, there are months of preparation. Performers may sustain bad injuries and 35 have to endure endless drills of the same act. But when you are onstage, you never let that show.

A turtle was spotted laying eggs at a sandy beach in East Coast Park by a member of the public on 23 August 2017. While hatchlings have been regularly seen, it is rare to see a turtle laying eggs in Singapore. The 141 eggs laid by the critically endangered hawksbill turtle have been moved to a safer location with less human activity and low light pollution.



The atomic reactor is a fascinating device which is heavily relied upon during crime investigations.
