




The street will be filled with people, music, the aroma of delicious food and the display of the red lanterns that everyone looks forward to.

Since she was a little girl, Jean Wendell had a special rapport with animals. However, in the two years since her family brought Sunny Boy home to their farm in Louisiana, the 16-year-old had bonded more closely with her horse than anyone had expected.

Abused when he was a young colt years before. Sunny Boy was spooked 5 by almost any human contact. "No one could ride him," said Jean's Dad, Mark, "but my daughter had an immediate calming effect on him that allowed her to saddle him up for a ride." Sunny Boy and Jean quickly became inseparable.

At the local Redbud Festival Parade in March 2008, the whole Wendell

family — Mark, his wife Bobbi, Jean and her younger sister, Kristen — decked

themselves out in Western gear and trotted on their horses behind the parade

contingent's commander. Jean rode Sunny Boy and Kristen was on her pony,

Angel. As the parade made its final round in the city square, a 75-pound pit bull

shot out of the crowd, making a beeline for Angel and began to attack her. When

Angel moved away in panic and tried to kick the dog away, Kristen quickly jumped

off the pony to avoid being thrown off. The snarting dog then turned on Kristen.

Seeing this, Jean dismounted to protect her sister.

"We watched in horror," recalled Mark. When Jean let go of the reins, Sunny
Boy was very nervous and neighed in fear. Then he acted as if he was going to run
off. However, as the pit bult dog whipped around to pounce on Jean, all 1,200
pounds of Sunny Boy bolted across and he jumped between them. He astonished
everyone by squaring off and kicking the dog hard in the face. "I was shocked,"
said Jean. "Usually, he avoids other animals."

The tenacious dog flipped around and raced to another horse. It began snapping and tearing gashes in the legs of Mark's horse. Chaos reigned until animal control officials moved in and finally captured the dog, which was later euthanised. Jean's friends clustered around her, exclaiming, "Your horse saved you!"

Looking back on the incident, Mark described the behaviour of Sunny Boy as highly unusual. "I've been around horses all my life and have not seen a horse take on another animal like that," Mark commented. That night, Jean visited Sunny Boy out in the pasture. "I gave him treats and told him how thankful I was that he had protected me. I think he already knew how I felt."

Sunny Boy, the unlikely hero, participated in an equine-assisted therapy programme for troubled youths later in the year. Without a doubt, he remained as

Jean's hero for many years to come.







We had reached the halfway point of our expedition in Vietnam's central highlands. Now it was time for the most stomach-churning part of the trip – an abseil* down the waterfall.

"Do people ever fall?" I asked as I peered over the waterfall that cascaded across the cliff before plunging into a pool 25 metres below.

"Oh, yeah." said my guide, Peter. "All the time."

I found myself rooted to the spot. Now it would be even more difficult to do it. "He doesn't mean people fall. He means people slip all the time," my partner, Natalie said. "Even if we let go of our rope, we are still attached to the safety rope fixed at the top of the waterfall."

We had been waiting for twenty minutes. My apprehension was building as the number of members of the group that made their absell down the waterfall gradually increased. Before I knew it, it was my turn. Natalie turned to me, her face full of concern. "Are you all right? You are okay with heights, right?" The answer to her questions was in my blood-drained face.

The rocks were slick with black-green vegetation and I quickly lost my footing and crashed into the rock face. Water poured over my head, hammering my helmet face. I tried to regain my footing several times but could not – the rock was too slippery and the weight of the roaring water kept pressing down on my legs. I tried a few more times to regain my footing. Tried and failed. Eventually I gave up and continued my descent, feet dangling. A few minutes later, after a short drop into the water and a swim, I reached the bank. I was alive and I felt good despite my ordeal.

This adventure was turning out to be quite enjoyable. The day before, Natalie and I had tried rafting in a two-person inflatable raft. Despite a few steering mistakes where we were carried by the fast-flowing water straight into some tree branches along the banks, we reached our destination largely unscathed. Though the rafting was fun, the abseil down the waterfall got my adrenaline pumping. I figured the worst was over after I had conquered the waterfall, but next came a cliff jump. I stood on the brink of jumping several times, my heart in my mouth and blood pounding in my ears. Each time I backed out at the last second before finally stepping out and plummeting to the pool below.

Finally, we faced another abseil, notoriously known as the 'washing machine'. Shorter than the first abseil, it was still a challenge. One member of the group panicked at that point and scrambled down the trail to the river below. After my two earlier victories, the 'washing machine' seemed manageable.

I made it down swiftly and dropped into the pool. After being whirled around a few times at the bottom of the waterfall, I floated onwards and the river pushed me downstream.

I had emerged from the expedition in one piece. And I would probably do it again.

- Keep a healthy weight. Reduce your salt intake. The recommended sodium intake is 5-6 grams of salt per day (around a teaspoon). Refrain from snacking in between the main meals.
- In order to reduce your salt intake, try and limit the amount of processed and restaurant food and do not add salt to food.

Drink súfficient water!

- Drink enough water throughout the day.
- What you eat also provides a significant portion of your fluid needs.
 On average, food provides about 20 percent of total water intake, while the remaining 80 percent comes from water and beverages of all kinds.
- Kidneys are not able to function without water. Each kidney filters the blood every 2 minutes.

The records of natural history contain many astonishing examples of the ability of animals to find their way home after making long journeys. Salmon, for example, are born in freshwater streams but they swim down to the sea to grow and mature. A few years later, they swim back upstream to breed and sometimes, even to die. Hence, the particular stream in which they die in is almost always the same one in which they were born.

What underwater signposts can these fish possibly follow? Biologists have discovered that the salmon, like many other fish, has an acute sense of smell and is able to remember slight differences in the chemical composition of water. It remembers the distinctive "fragrance" of its native stream so that as it moves upstream and meets with dozens or hundreds of streams along the way, it is stillable to make the correct choice each time until it finally arrives home.

Long-distance migration is especially common in birds, because many species must make yearly journeys between their nesting sites and prime feeding areas far away. Each year, over 100,000 sooty terns, a seabird, travel from the west coast of Africa all the way across the Atlantic to a tiny island near the tip of Florida in the United States. Here they build their nests and breed. Once the young can fly, they all fly back over the Atlantic. Why do they migrate at all? Isolated islands tend to provide protection from predators like cats and foxes. Therefore, like many other seabirds, making the trans-oceanic voyage to reach one such haven is better than nesting on the nearby African shores.

A somewhat different reason lies behind the north-south migration of birds in the temperate areas. In spring, birds like geese, ducks and robins make their way north into the countryside where large quantities of food are becoming freshly available. Without delay, they quickly rear one or more broods of young. As winter approaches and the food supply declines, all fly south again.

Human beings could never make such journeys unaided by maps and navigational instruments. How do birds do it? A large part of the answer lies in their ability to use celestial clues. They use the position of the sun or stars in the sky to guide them. Experiments have been conducted where a type of bird called indigo bunting attempt flights under the artificial night sky of a planetarium. The birds would use the position of groups of stars in the planetarium sky to guide their flight.

Migrating birds not only can figure out the compass directions, but they also exhibit the ability to determine their position on the surface of the earth with reference to the position of their intended destination. They can sense the earth's magnetic field, which varies in an orderly way from point to point over the earth's surface and that then enables a bird that is using it to travel home even over unfamiliar terrain and great distances.





For the first ten years of my life in Hong Kong, my elder sister and I had to share a room while my two brothers had their own rooms. My elder sister and I knew in our hearts that we were both viewed with contempt by the rest of the family. We were both girls and everyone considered me to be a source of bad luck because my mother had died giving birth to me.

My elder sister was like a mother to me. She paid the greatest attention to everything about me. Most of all, she cared about my education and checked my homework every evening. Whenever I got a good report card, she would lock it in her drawer and wear the key around her neck, as if my grades were preclous jewels which were impossible to replace. She also encouraged me to read and soon I developed a 10 passion for writing. I used to scribble kung fu stories in a special notebook and would bring them to school. It thrilled me to show my stories to my classmates and watch them giggle.

When I was thirteen years old, my father told me that I was to leave school at seventeen and get a job because he no longer wished to pay for my education. I protested but it was no use. Desperate to go to university, I begged my grandfather. Ye Ye, to negotiate on my behalf. On one of my rare visits home from boarding school, the whole family had got together for dinner. After dinner, Ye Ye cornered my father and they had a private conversation. Afterwards. Ye Ye related that my father had been unsympathetic. My father had said that a daughter should never be too well-educated because it would spoil any slim chance of getting married. According to him, no sane man would ever want a bride 20 with a university degree.

I was terrified, remembering how my elder sister never finished secondary school and was forced into an arranged marriage at the age of seventeen. Fate intervened in the nick of time in the shape of a writing competition I had entered some months previously. Unknown to me, my name was in the newspapers for having won first prize. This convinced 25 my father to send me to England for higher education.

Several years later, in England, while waiting for medical school to start, I applied for a vacation job as a clerk in a small firm. Over the phone, the manager gave me directions to his firm and asked if I was ready to start work that day. As soon as he saw my Chinese face, however, his attitude changed. Avoiding my eyes, he told me that the position had been filled. The manager was a nice man because I could hear the embarrassment in his voice as he repeated the Ile. He probably knew that I would be a good worker and he was reluctant to let me go. His rejection did not devastate me because I knew that I would be able to find similar work elsewhere...

Throughout my studies in England, I knew in my heart that if I remained there, I 35 would not be given the same opportunities as my English classmates. After graduating from medical school, I went back to Hong Kong. To my shock and dismay, my colleagues resented me because I was a graduate of an English rather than a Hong Kong medical school and I spoke with a strange accent like a foreigner. No matter how hard I tried to please them, I remained an outsider.

During a big clean-up last year, my son came across something unusual nestled inside a heart-shaped gift box. "Dad, there's only one! Where is the other one?" he asked with a **puzzled** expression as he held up an old but clean track shoe. I nodded. He then showed me a yellowish brown note which read: "Thanks, Greg, for everything! I am keeping the other shoe to share my story with others. Thank you for 'SOS' or I wouldn't be 5 where I am today!"

Immediately, I was transported to another time. "We can't throw this. It's special," I said slowly. My son looked at me strangely so I explained.

As a youth runner, I earned many individual trophies and team medals at national championship meets. The early success I enjoyed **came to a crashing halt** when I was in high school. My ambitious goals and dreams were replaced with a stress fracture in my left hip. In the following year, disappointment struck again in the form of serious knee problems. At that time, I could not have been more devastated.

While I was put out of action, I realised how deeply I loved running and all it had given me – confidence, dedication, skills, improved health and friendships. I was uncertain if I would eventually be able to run again and I felt terribly miserable. However, I started thinking about those who could not enjoy this great sport and its many benefits – not because of injury, but simply because they could not afford running shoes. I then started 'Share Our Soles' (SOS), my own non-profit organisation dedicated to giving running shoes to underprivileged youth. I was quite sure my idea would strike a chord with many people.

By spreading the word about my project and placing collection boxes at schools, gyms and sports stores, I managed to amass one hundred pairs of running shoes in the first month. I personally collected and scrubbed them by hand. With great determination to succeed, I eventually donated more than 2000 pairs of refurbished running shoes. From then on, I had no plans of slowing down. SOS exceeded my expectations in terms of numbers and it also allowed me to distribute the shoes to more places than I dared think possible. It went as far as Sudan Uganda and Kenya in Africa. The feedback from the youths in Africa was especially touching. Not only were these the first running shoes any of them had ever owned, but they were also the first shoes of any kind most of them had ever had.

People assume that scrubbing dirty and smelly shoes would be a gross chore. The truth was while I was toiling away at the sink, I actually found myself-smilling. I imagined the smile of the kid when he or she received the shoes, laced them up and went out for a fun? While scrubbing away, I told myself I was trying to make a difference in my own way, one shoe and one person at a time. An Olympic marathon bronze medalist, Deena Kastor, a 35 huge supporter of SOS, gave me an encouragement note: Greg, continue making a positive difference in all you do!

"Throughout your life, you need to stay positive even in difficult times. Even when facing challenges, think of those who are less fortunate than you are," I advised my son. "In fact, if you can, you should help them, Son." I could not help but notice the glitter of pride 40 and enlightenment in his eyes.

Today, we use many different devices to go online to keep in touch with friends and family, take pictures, do our homework, do research, find out the latest news, and even shop. However, are you aware of the dangers lurking online? Here are two true stories taken from the news recently...

"14 year-old boy" was actually adult male in mid-40s

"He told me during our online chat that he was 14 and studied at a school next to mine. He knew the school I studied in because he had seen my school name on my personal profile. We had chatted online for six months before we arranged to meet at the nearby MRT station. When this middle-aged man approached me and called my name, I got a shock. He asked me to join him for a drink at MacDonalds but I refused and ran off. Luckily, a teacher from my school was on her way home and I ran to her and told her what had happened. The man ran off when my teacher walked towards him. I didn't expect him to lie to me as he seemed very nice online. -"Laura", 12 (not her real name)

"She knew so much about me it was scary! Then I realised..."

"This pretty lady approached me after my CCA and called my name. I had never met her before but she seemed rather nice. She claimed to be a distant relative who lived in Malaysia. We even had the same surname! She asked me how the different members of my family were and even asked about my pet dog. She then offered to send me home. She was so nice that I accepted until I saw a man in the driver's seat of the car she led me to. I felt uncomfortable and quickly came up with an excuse and walked away. When I got home, I realised that all the things the lady had spoken to me about were things I had posted online - "Jane", 12 (not her real name)

These are just two of many similar encounters with online predators. Thankfully, 'Laura' and 'Jane' managed to get out of the situation and stayed safe. But others may not be so fortunate.

17-year-old Ashley Yong saved up for her senior prom* but, ultimately used the money on something else entirely. Instead, the Chicago teen spent the money she saved up for one glamorous night on things that would make a lasting difference for the homeless people in her community. After seeing how much difference the money she saved could make, she now has even bigger plans in the works to help even more people!

Ashley knew that her father was not going to pay for her prom since he had always frowned on such events which he described as extravagant. Besides. her family was not very well-to-do and the money could be used for more meaningful things. Ashley had always borne a grudge and lamented about how unfortunate she was to be in such a position. However, she was determined to go to the prom and began saving on her own for the high-cost event that, on average, costs prom-goers in the United States about a thousand dollars. But after spending hours online looking for hair, makeup, and dress ideas, she had a revelation - "After a while, I realised that I was too consumed in figuring out how to make one night the best night of my life."

So Ashley took a look at those less fortunate around her, and realised that her savings could make a big difference for homeless people in her community. She spent nearly all of her savings on items like socks, food and toothbrushes, packed them in boxes, and distributed them in person the evening after the 20 prom. Ashley said that she was initially sad seeing pictures of her friends at the prom without her, but seeing the looks on people's faces as they opened her boxes of donations changed everything. "Their smiles said it all, and my heart burst with happiness. It was the best night of my life!" Ashley recalled. "As my dad and I drove away from the children excitedly rummaging through the boxes, I started crying. I told my dad I could not believe how blessed we really were."

Although most of her classmates were supportive, a few were critical, arguing that she did it for attention. Ashley's response was that they were right she did do it for attention but not for herself. She filmed her project because she wanted to raise awareness of local homelessness and show people how easy it 30 was to help. "I'm a high schooler with no job, car or really anything I own to sustain myself. Giving isn't hard, and it most definitely is not impossible," she observed. She then added, "I might not have had the opportunity to dress myself up nor have any memories of the prom but I know that I've helped others and that has made me a better person. And I want to do more!"

Ashley now plans to repeat her efforts on a larger scale, using funds from an online campaign, which has already raised over \$1,400. She also hopes in future to create a non-profit group dedicated to helping homeless people. She said, "It is the experiences you gain when you volunteer actively and meet different people that make you a better person. I hope that more people will 40 get involved but not by just putting money into a cup."



Section I: Comprehension Open-ended (20 marks)

Read this passage and answer questions 71 to 80.

Three miles to the south squatted the only village on the whole island – a sorry-looking clutch of houses on stilts with a population of about four hundred impoverished souls. The village's domestic goats and chickens were fenced up beneath the houses during the day and gathered up the vertical steps into their owners' houses at night. The villagers' staple diet was the squid which was netted from their boats daily. They feared the Komodo Dragons. Only a few villagers ventured inland as nervous guides to the rare outsiders.

On my first visit, we chose the safer of two promising sites for dragon-spotting, a short walk to Loho Liang, barely a mile inland to an observational ledge overlooking a dried riverbed. Here, the reptiles could be observed from the safety above. Alternatively, we could have made a four-hour long walk up to Poreng, the open land where the Dragons could be encountered at eye level, and where the offering of a sacrificial goat was even more essential for distracting their gastronomic attentions from their observers.

The Dragons were like the Angels of Death. Their mouths carried bacteria to which there was no known cure. A victim might escape an initial attack with only a slight wound which within a few days would fester and stink so strongly that it was easy for the Dragons to sniff the victim down with their forked tongues and eat it.

It was long assumed that the Komodo Dragon was a scavenging carrion-eater, rather than a hunter, and that like most reptiles it was most active during the day, but inactive at night. However, studies showed that it did carry out some nocturnal activities. Some thought that it could grow to only a metre long but evidence showed that it could grow to three metres long. These three myths were proven untrue by Walter Auffenberg, a scientist, who made the most comprehensive study of the creature.

Six weeks later, when the ship returned with passengers, I found myself leading a group of thirty people on the short walk to Loho Liang's dried riverbed. With us were Des and Jenny who were coming along to film. We had waited some time at the observational ledge and I was beginning to worry. Finally, a large solitary Dragon arrived. It immediately uprooted our goat and disappeared behind the undergrowth with its prize. Sensing a chance to show off, I came down from the observational ledge in hot pursuit of the Dragon. I saw the wooden post and the rope which was used to tie the goat at the point of vanishing beneath some bushes. I gripped the rope and was dragged helplessly along with the goat into the full-body embrace of a tree with thorns.

Every part of my body was held fast. I had only a few moments to think about the Dragon ahead before realising that barely twenty metres away behind me was an entire group of Dragons fast advancing. I debated on whether to tear myself loose from the tree and leaving my skin hanging on it or to shout for help. With no time to lose, I yelled. One of the guides reached me and freed me from the thoms of the tree.

Des, in the meantime, had approached the opposite side of the undergrowth, where he had accurately located the Dragon. He fooled it into releasing the goat from its jaws and marched back to the cheering crowd, holding the goat triumphantly. His heroic pose was short-lived. Hurrying up behind him on one side was the now irritated first Dragon. On the other, the guide and my bleeding self, hotly pursued by a group of hungry Dragons. It was not a pretty sight.

Kites Throughout History


At 1.00 p.m. and 3.00 p.m., Dr. Brian Lee of Punggol Community College will discuss the historical development of kites, from the earliest Chinese examples to the discovery of electricity by Benjamin Franklin, who used only a kite, some string and a metal key.





In his *first presentation, Dr. Lee will discuss the history of kites. Kites are thought to have been invented by the Chinese more than 2,000 years ago and then quickly "flew" over the rest of the world. Since the 1600s, kites have been popular throughout Europe.

In the **second presentation, Dr. Lee will discuss how kites have been used by scientists. Benjamin Franklin was just one of the scientists who used kites as an ingenious means to make important discoveries. In fact, in the early 1800s, Sir George Cayley used kites to try to build a flying machine that carried people. He actually answered important scientific questions using kites. Sir George's discoveries helped the Wright brothers when they built the first successful airplane. In the 1820s George Pocock used kites to construct a powered carriage. With four kites, the powered carriage could reach speeds of approximately 30 kilometres per hour.

By our third encounter, we had complete confidence in Randy Renado, our whale shark interaction officer. He had the ability to look into both the immediate future and the grey-green waters of the Sibuyan Sea. "Now, look down," he would command shortly after my wife, our twin daughters and I had donned our masks, snorkels and flippers. We would drop over the side of our 40-foot wooden, outrigger short boat that had been guided to a patch of gently undulating water and wait for the appearance of the creature.

Sure enough, three or four seconds later, the hulking outline of a 25 foot whale shark, known here in the Philippines as a butanding could be discerned coming towards us through the luminescent water. We could see its enormous, flattened head rhythmically swaying as its elongated dark checkerboard of a body passed five or six feet below us, before disappearing back into the waters.

It was indeed quite a magnificent sight to behold as we swam alongside the gentle giant. We would see it a total of nine times that morning before the whale sharks, which tend to be early feeders, made themselves scarce by the late morning. We had certainly come to the right place to see it. Donsol, on the south-eastern coast of the main Philippine island of Luzon, bills itself as "the whale shark capital of the world", a boast generally accepted because the whale sharks here swim relatively close to the surface and the chances of seeing multiple whale sharks on any given day are high. For that, Donsol was named by TIME Magazine as the best wildlife encounter destination in Asia in 2004.

We spent some time looking for accommodation. All the hotels we shortlisted were either lacking in basic facilities or looked extremely rundown. We finally settled on one which looked decent enough. We then flagged down two motorised tricycles to take us half a mile to the Philippine Department of Tourism visitor's centre to hire our boat for the next day, pre-pay our visitor's fee and watch a compulsory pre-dive orientation video depicting just what awaited us the next morning. I did not understand why we had to go through that twelve-minute presentation about facts we all knew by heart already. Of course, nothing could quite match the real experience.

The whale shark is widely misunderstood by humans because of its confusing name. Many people associate it with the more well-known and terrifying predator, the Great White. However, like baleen whales, it filter-feeds on microscopic plankton and thus poses no danger to humans, unless they happen to be inadvertently slapped by its ten-foot tail. Apparently, the whale sharks have been coming to these plankton-rich waters for years and were known to frequently destroy the nets of Donsol's fishermen. Yet, it was not until a team of foreign divers filmed them in 1998 that they stopped seeing the whale shark as a form of nuisance to their livelihood but as a potentially profitable complement. A decade later, some 10,000 eco-tourists make their way here every year to swim alongside the whale sharks, and in the process, contribute to the local economy.

The number of members can be between 5 and 15. The average lifespan of an Idol group is about 5 years before they become solo artists, actors or masters of ceremonies.

Nasreen's stepmother believed that females should do housework instead of studying and reading books. She felt that education would not serve a woman well in becoming a good wife and mother and was always reminding her stepdaughter of this.

These taunts made Nasreen even more determined to achieve her dream even for someone with limited resources like herself. From a very young age, she had decided that one day, she would become a maternal healthcare nurse. It was a profession she had been exposed to when she was a little girl, when roving government healthcare teams made regular visits to the local villages. She vividly remembered the joy with which she anticipated immunisation shots, just so she could interact with the workers in their white coats.

"I loved the smell of antiseptics. I also envied how they would write down all the babies' names, height and weight and immunisation details in tidy rows in a notebook bound by spiral wires," she said.

Fuelled by her dream, Nasreen studied relentlessly despite her stepmother's harassment. She would tend to her siblings and do all the housework before reading late at night. She persisted in this manner and received her diploma in 1995 at the age of fifteen. She was the first of a handful of women from her region to do so. She also received another first – she was awarded a scholarship that would enable her to obtain her rural medical assistant degree.

However, Nasreen had been engaged to a handsome but lazy young man from a nearby village. Bibi Nisa, her mother-in-law, feared that Nasreen would neglect her household duties because of her studies.

The council of elders who decided on all matters of local importance supported Bibi Nisa's objections. They forbade Nasreen from accepting the scholarship.

During the ten years that followed this decision, Nasreen dutifully obeyed her mother-in-law and toiled for sixteen hours daily. She spent her days tending goats and sheep in the mountain, tilling her family's potato fields, hauling water in metal cans and gathering firewood.

Despite the drudgery and frustration, Nasreen waited out her decade of hard work. During the little free time she had, she kept her healthcare dream alive by seeking out and caring for the sick, the elderly and the dying within her community.

"The lamp of my life refused to be snuffed out. My kerosene of hope will never run dry," she said when interviewed just before taking up her scholarship in 2007.

She also said, "If you educate a boy, you educate an individual, but if you educate a girl, you educate a community."
