Have you ever wondered where your vegetables come from?

Singapore imports most of our produce from all over the world. This is because Singapore does not have enough land for farming. To ensure Singapore is able to produce its own food, the Government is encouraging urban farming. In fact, in recent years, urban farming has become increasingly popular as people are more curious about the source of their vegetables and fruits. Singaporeans are worried about the amount of pesticide used. More people are growing edible plants in urban spaces, such as balconies and HDB corridors, without the use of pesticides.

Located at Kranji, City Farm is one of the more established urban farms in Singapore. On weekends, they offer farm tours and workshops for parents and children to get in touch with nature and learn about the importance of growing their own vegetables. They also help design and build **edible gardens** for residential use so that more Singaporeans can enjoy their own fresh produce. 



To me, Grandma's house was my second home. I had spent my entire childhood living at Grandma's and I used to visit her often even through adulthood. Standing at the front door, I stared at the twisted vines that crept up the exterior of the house, trying to devour the entire structure. The door creaked open, and Grandma's blank eyes met mine. I looked deep into her eyes, hoping to see the woman who was once full of life. Now, she was a shell of her former self. Her gaze dropped to a photograph of me in her hand. She took another glance at me. Leaving the door open, she walked back into the house. I took that as my cue to enter.

The familiarity of the place struck me. I remembered the hint of jasmine in the air. It made me feel at ease, at home. I caught sight of the patchwork quilt that Grandma had painstakingly sewn together for me over months. It was what kept me warm at night during my childhood. Yet a wave of unfamiliarity hit. I looked over at Grandma, still staring blankly at the photograph. I wanted to be a part of Grandma's life once again. I was prepared for battle. I searched for more photographs of our good times together in the hope of jogging her memory. I showed her many videos of us that I had in my mobile phone. I tried all I could.

She still gazed blankly at me. The truth was clearer than water. She had no recollection of me at all. Tears welled up in my eyes and threatened to course down my cheeks. My heart shattered. The battle was lost.

Not wanting Grandma to notice, I excused myself and ran to the nearby park. I sat under a gigantic tree, obscured from the prying eyes of children at the nearby playground. Tears eventually found their way down my cheeks. I sobbed for the loss of everything; the grandma

He could barely stop himself from yelling out in exhilaration.

"Go Hwa!" The wind carried over a familiar voice. He looked around and spotted Li-An upwind of him -- in a stationary speedboat -- with someone at the helm. She waved at Hwa and he nodded his head in acknowledgement, even though he knew she was too far away to see him. 



Optimism goes beyond seeing the bright side of a situation or expecting good | 5 things. When something good happens, optimists believe that their abilities cause the situation to turn out well. They see their abilities as permanent parts of themselves. Their way of thinking is contrary to the pessimistic views.

When things do not go as expected, optimism lets us see disappointing events as temporary situations that we can get past. It motivates us to keep working towards our goals. Due to this, optimistic people feel more in control of their situations and have higher self-esteem.

Pessimism influences us to take disappointments personally. A pessimistic outlook exaggerates the negative aspects of a situation which overshadow anything positive. Pessimistic thinking makes it harder to cope when things do not go as hoped.

Optimists are prepared to face challenges in their lives with true confidence. They do not pretend that life is perfect as they choose to focus on what they can do to make things better in a bad situation.

Here is an example: Joan and Megan both tried out for the basketball school team. Neither makes the final cut. Both feel disappointed, but they handle it differently.

Joan is a pessimist. When she saw the result, she thought, "I should not have done it. I worked on this but my hands are too small. I have the worst basketball skills among the participants. Otherwise, why must my coach keep telling me how to improve? He must be upset with my performance. I should have listened to my father when he told me not to try. I should quit the team."

Megan is an optimist. Looking at the same result, she inferred, "There was a lot of talent at the tryouts and only a few openings. That pushed me to practise hard and I played my best - it felt good! The coach gave me great feedback. I'm going to work on the things he suggested and watch all the games played by my school team this year. That way, I'll have a better chance next year."

Megan is focused on the specific situation. She does not see the situation as permanent. She plans her next move to make her goal happen. Joan, on the other hand, thinks that she was the worst one at the tryouts and the coach did not like her. She decided

to face the fact that she cannot play basketball. Unlike Megan, Joan sees failures as permanent weaknesses of herself and she cannot do anything about it. She blames herself, but she also sees outside factors such as her coach working against her. Ultimately, she lets this one setback cast doubt on her athletic abilities.

Optimism is a thinking style that can be learned. Just keep telling yourself, "I can be more optimistic and I'm going to keep practising!"

### **History**

FoodShare is a non-profit organisation that feeds the needy through its food distribution programme. It was established in February 2010 after Anthony and Ida Bandara read a report in The Citizen Times about bakeries discarding their unsold bread. Roused to action, they then decided to channel surplus food from bakeries to those in need.

FoodShare started with 130 volunteers in 2010. At the end of 2021, our volunteers had multiplied to over 12,000, and together we reached 50,300 beneficiaries across Singapore.

Here's what our Bread Runner of 10 years, Martin Goh, has to say:

Share with us how you have deliberately made giving part of your daily life.

Every Sunday evening, my family and I go on our Bread Run route, where we collect unsold bread and buns at Jia Yi Bakery and deliver them to St. Luke's ElderCare Centre. We also help out at Narayana Social Service on a monthly basis as a family, where we pack food rations together for distribution to the needy.

Perhaps that's why your daughters have this ingrained desire to give. They always have a huge smile on their faces on your Bread Runs!

Yes, they are happy to go on the routes! FoodShare's concept of saving unsold bread that is in perfectly good condition and giving it out to those who need it makes a lot of sense to us.

My elder daughter organises community service activities like food packing and distribution with her own friends as well. She would also save up the money she earned from her own entrepreneurial efforts and buy food for the needy.

Can you share some of your thoughts about contributing to the community? It's very natural that when you do something good for others, you feel good about it yourself. That itself is a reward. If you have time, give your time. If you have money, share it. If you're blessed with both, do both. The more you give, the more you receive.





You can also learn to create illustrations of plants by sketching and making collages. Bring your own colouring tools as there are limited ones provided.





#### **Forest Discovery Centre**

The gallery is housed in one of the oldest bungalows in Singapore. It showcases Singapore's forest ecosystems highlights the importance of conserving them. Visitors can learn about forest habitats and forest restoration efforts. There is also an exhibition explaining how both this building and the art gallery were conserved and refurbished for their present use.








# Feature: Light Displays at the Visual Arts Museum

Born with a severe condition that left him paralysed from the waist down, many doctors doubted he would live more than a few days. However, he defied all odds and spent the first six years of his life without a wheelchair and medical care in an orphanage. "If I want to be what other children aspire to be, I have to get there myself," David recalled. At six, he was adopted and following that, many things happened. Thanks to his adoptive parents, he underwent several surgeries to improve his condition. As a result, he was able to attend school and even took up sports to help strengthen his bones and muscles. Then, he fell in love with wheelchair racing. Unfortunately, he did not have a lot of coordination or strength but he had a will to keep 15 going. One day, David's teachers encouraged him to compete alongside his nonwheelchair schoolmates. Unsure and yet grateful for the opportunity, he thought he should give it a shot. Adjusting the cap on his head and his gloves, David was all ready to protect himself from the heat and the vigorous strokes to his wheelchair. Some of his fingers had pieces of plasters to protect the blisters which had developed during his rigorous training. David's eyes followed the starter who was waving a red flag. As soon as the gun was fired, David was off. The entire stadium 25 erupted into thunderous cheers.

David pushed forward with all his might, his hands gripping the wheels the whole time for the long-distance race. His wheelchair rolled steadily out of the stadium. passing the shophouses. David fell behind despite doing everything he could to keep up with the other competitors. With each passing hour, David was breathing harder.
